The mysterious dark gray soils of Meridiani Planum and scientifically exciting Martian bedrock (right), which are possibly 3-4 billion years old are imaged by the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory/Cornell Panoramic Camera on the Mars rover Opportunity, which landed Jan. 24 (see p. 28). Note the bowl shape of crater walls and how the soil color brightens to red where disturbed by lander airbags. The rover will sample the soils and bedrock and then drive out of the crater.
